Letter from the Executive Director

Every now and again I go into one of EC3øs classrooms and read to the children. Typically I bring a book that was one of my childhood favorites, and while I read I am reminded what it was like to be transported by listening to a story.

EC3 has a story of its ownô one that began even before its doors first opened in 1984. State government employees from several departments began convening and surveying parents as early as 1975, building momentum through the early 1980s, toward the increased demand for high-quality early learning. In his 1984 State-of-the-State address, Governor James Blanchard directed state agencies to establish pilot child care programs by the end of 1985. EC3 was born out of this ten-year effort, beginning a new chapter of its story.

Intertwined with EC3øs story are those of its teachers and familiesô observations, memories, experiences, and dreams for the future can be found in these other stories. Several such stories are told and depicted on these pages so that the reader may sense EC3øs unique personality from several perspectives. Taken together, these stories help us celebrate how far weøve come in three decades, and they help us build on that legacy in a way that keeps us true to our core mission.

The unifying theme of all these stories is the love of children, the commitment to high-quality early learning, and the support of hard-working families in the Greater Lansing area. This

support comes not only in financial form, but also through the time and talents of families, friends, and neighbors who participate in our community-building efforts. These vital contributions make EC3 a truly remarkable place, for families and employees alike.

Letter from the Board Chair

The 2014-2015 fiscal year was significant for EC3 in several ways. We experienced growth in enrollment; we saw many members of our teaching staff attain new and greater credentials in the early learning field; and we reached fundraising goals that exceeded any in the past. In addition, several initiatives were begun that will bolster EC3ø legacy and reputation as a leader in early education best practices.

- We entered into a collaborative partnership with Capital Area Community Services to provide low-income families with free child care through an Early Head Start grant.
- We enhanced our nutritional practices and training to become eligible to participate in the Michigan Department of Education & Steve Purchase, Chair, EC3 Board of Child and Adult Care Food Program, where a portion of our Directors food expense is reimbursed through a grant from the U.S. Department of Agriculture.



- The Board of Directors held a retreat to monitor progress toward EC3¢ strategic goals.
- We began the process of adopting a new curriculum to align our instructional practices with outcome measurements that give both teachers and parents a better understanding of childrenøs learning abilities and styles.

These accomplishments are only part of the story, of course. EC3øs staff and Board of Directors continue to promote growth and realize improvements in the years aheadô both for the program and for the infrastructure. We continue to explore ways to earn revenue from non-tuition sources so that EC3 remains strong through its regular business cycles. Likewise, we will continue to model the highest standards for EC3øs teachers in an effort to advocate for professionalism in the early learning field.

Over the next year, EC3 will continue to use its unique position in the Greater Lansing community to enhance early learning for the benefit of all families. We are grateful for the support of so many families and staff members, both current and former, and we are optimistic about our prospects for success.

WORKING WITH CHILDREN

Parents at EC3 who notice a paint- or glitter-covered person walking and singing down the hallway with toddlers on any given day shouldnot be alarmedô itos just me, Ada, and I am a toddler teacher. The reason I am singing (besides the fact that it is fun) is that playing with words and rhymes builds cognitive connections in childrenos brains and gives them permission to play with words in new ways, even if they do not articulate them quite yet. The reason I am covered in paint and/or glitter (these *were* clean clothes this morning, I swear!) is that hands-on exploration of the worldô not to mention trying to feed yourself independentlyô is MESSY!

These activities (painting with squirt bottles, pounding on drums with glitter, filling containers with seeds) are giving children confidence to explore and make their unique mark on the world. They are gaining fine motor and pre-math and science skills that will enable them to become creative problem solvers who can reason things out. You may hear some crying (really, it is okay) because learning how to


interact appropriately with peers and articulate emotions when you can¢t quite talk is frustrating. EC3 parents know that I am supporting their child and directing them in appropriate ways to respond, while acknowledging their emotions (sometimes you just gotta cry.) These children are your most precious possession and will influence a world that is entirely different from ours, but because of the foundation you have given them at home and the investment you allow us as teachers to make in their lives at EC3, they will do well. Each child has a space in my heart and it makes me happy to hear when they succeed.

CURRICULUM AND ASSESSMENT

As EC3 strives towards excellence, we continually evaluate our curriculum and assessment standards. This year, the staff at EC3 began using the õCreative Curriculum,ö developed by Teaching Strategies for Early Childhood. This research-based program, while philosophically similar to our past instructional model, has added benefits not previously incorporated in EC3øs curriculum. Both the õCreative Curriculum for Preschoolersö and the õCreative Curriculum for Infants, Toddlers & Twosö address planning, instruction, and assessment, helping us prepare children for kindergarten and beyond.

■ The Creative Curriculum is based on 38 objectives for development and learning, which are fully aligned with the *Head*

- It addresses all the important areas of learning, from social-emotional and math to technology and the arts, and incorporates them throughout every part of every day.
- The curriculum helps teachers and caregivers implement developmentally appropriate practices and offer responsive daily routines and meaningful experiences that nurture learning and development.
- It offers daily, built-in opportunities for observation, helping teachers and administrators clearly see the strong relationship between curriculum and assessment.
- The curriculum is paired with an assessment program to maximize learning opportunities.
- The Creative Curriculum contains guidance for individualizing instruction, helping teachers meet the needs of all learners, including advanced learners and children with disabilities.
- It provides built-in guidance for building meaningful partnerships with families that are an essential factor in any program.

Weekly Teacher Lesson Plans will continue to present parents with a range of fun, ageappropriate activities designed to challenge and support growth in all areas of learning. Consistent daily routines help support a childøs emotional comfort and promote opportunities to learn in a hands-on, play-based environment.




TOTAL LIABILITIES AND NET ASSETS



EC3 has traditionally brought in most of its operating funds from tuition and fees paid by families of enrolled children, and this was the case in FY 2014 (October 1, 2014 through September 30, 2015).



Appropriately for a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization, the vast majority of EC3øs budget (approximately 84%) was spent on its programô that is, the staff and materials used to care for and educate children and their families. Owning a 1929-built structure brings with it an ongoing host of repairs and improvements, but EC3 has managed to contain such costs to just 10% or less of its budget. Administrative expenses took up the remainder.
